## **PREHISTORIC CONTEXTS**

The five prehistoric contexts are summaries of the current state of knowledge of prehistoric and protohistoric archaeology in Colorado, divided into five regional volumes by river basin. The state's leading archaeologists from among CCPA's membership authored these books in 1998 and 1999, an effort partially funded by a grant from the Colorado Historical Society State Historical Fund. These books are useful and invaluable resources for the state's professional and academic archaeologists, and agency cultural resource managers. CCPA ran a second printing of all five books in 2001, and a third in 2009. The books are available individually, or can be ordered as a set at a discounted price.

### **ANCIENT COLORADO**

*Ancient Colorado*, by David Grant Noble, is an excellent lay-person's summary of the extensive work presented in the five prehistoric contexts. This book was written as part of the Prehistoric Context project in 1999. It is a soft cover, magazine-style book with excellent color photos and illustrations, and intended for the general public.

### **COLORADO HISTORY: A CONTEXT FOR HISTORICAL ARCHAEOLOGY**

The Historical Archaeology Context is a follow-up to the very successful Prehistoric Contexts. CCPA members with expertise and interest in the historical archaeology of Colorado wrote this extensive volume in 2007, also with the aid of a Colorado Historical Society State Historic Fund Grant. The book is organized into chapters that each address either a temporal period or broad class of resources by type or socio-economic theme. The chapters cover protohistoric and historic Native Americans, Settlements, the Victorian expression in Colorado, Ethnicity, Rural Agriculture, Industry, Linear Resources, Recreation, and Government. The focus is on the archaeological manifestations of these aspects of Colorado History. This book is available individually, or as part of the six-context set (including the five prehistoric contexts) offered at a discounted price.

### **COLORADO ARCHAEOLOGY**

The journal *Colorado Archaeology* was started in 2005 and is published occasionally in place of one of the four quarterly issues of *Southwestern Lore*. *Colorado Archaeology* is a peer-reviewed journal focusing on papers describing current research in archaeology in Colorado. This book, Vol. 71, No. 4, in the *Southwestern Lore* series, is the inaugural issue, with a second issue due in 2009. Articles include:
