At our winter meeting in Denver on January 14, the Executive Committee again discussed changes to both the CCPA bylaws and the Code-of-Ethics regarding American Indian participation, membership, and other concerns. We were honored to have Barbara Booher, Clifford Duncan, Terry Knight, Alden Naranjo, and Susan Savage in attendance to help us reach a consensus on the specific language proposed as amendments to these two documents. The proposed amendments appear in this issue of the newsletter, and will be voted upon at the annual meeting in March. Please read them very carefully, keeping in mind the extensive discussions that have taken place between CCPA members and American Indians to reach this point in the process. The proposed language truly does represent a <u>consensus</u> of opinion, rather than a compromise of anyone's personal position.

Also in this issue of the newsletter is the ballot for election of officers and committee members. Biographical sketches of the various candidates have been included for those of you who may be unfamiliar with one or more of them. Thanks to all the candidates for graciously agreeing to offer your services to CCPA, and thanks to all the CCPA members who volunteered for these offices. Please vote early, but not too often.

Remember, your 1995 dues are due--you can send them in with your annual meeting registration or send them directly to the treasurer. Note that the Executive Committee has voted to raise the annual dues effective immediately. This increase was the result of extensive discussion and analysis of our financial condition, expected expenses in the near future, and comparative dues in similar state-level organizations. HERITAGE RESOURCE ZONES CREATED

Effective November 13, 1994, two heritage resource zone positions were created for the Roosevelt National Forest and the Pawnee National Grassland (USDA), and the Rocky Mountain National Park (NPS). The two agencies combined their management activities to form a North and South Zone.

The North Zone will encompass the Estes-Poudre and Redfeather Ranger Districts of the Roosevelt National Forest and the Pawnee National Grassland. This zone will be headquartered at the Forest Supervisor's Office in Ft. Collins and will be managed by John Slay. The South Zone will include the Clear Creek Ranger District of the Arapaho National Forest, the Boulder Ranger District of the Roosevelt National Forest, and the Rocky Mountain National Park. The South Zone will be headquartered at the Boulder Ranger District office in Boulder and will be managed by Bob Nykamp.

Both Mr. Slay and Mr. Nykamp have extensive experience in the management of federal heritage programs. Until the creation of the two zones, Mr. Slay served as the Forest Archeologist for the Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forests and Pawnee National Grassland, while Mr. Nykamp was the Forest Archeologist for the Routt National Forest from 1985 to 1991. The current zone positions are staffed at the same level of authority consistent with Federal guidelines and are intended to operate collaterally. The CCPA Education Committee is now in an early planning stage for a 1996 Annual Meeting Plenary Session on *The Current and Future Status of Colorado Archaeology: Theory and Practice.* The session will have three general themes:

1) describing the current state of knowledge of new and recent technical and theoretical approaches to field archaeology, the analysis of culturallyassociated materials, and the real and potential impact of those approaches on the practice of archaeology in the state,

2) an assessment of the state's (OAHP) site database and areas of data class and variable record improvement and the potential for increased electronic database accessibility for professionals, and

3) discussion of current and potential future guidelines for productive research designs at all levels of archaeological research (academic, contract, government, or avocational).

In particular, the session will focus on re-evaluation and re-assessment of recommendations, guidelines, and problems outlined in the 1984 RP3 regional overviews in light of current knowledge and advances, and address how those guidelines and problems have been dealt with since 1984 and 'where we go from here." The CCPA Education Committee would welcome any and all comments and recommendations concerning the proposed session. All offers of assistance are welcome and membership on the committee is open. Please read carefully; the full text of the current bylaws and code-of-ethics language was printed in the September 1990 CCPA Newsletter (volume 12, number 2).

Proposed Bylaws Amendments [new language underlined]:

Article II - Purpose

ADD: (g) establishing and promoting open communication and cooperation between archaeologists and the living descendents of groups subject to archaeological research in Colorado.

Article III. Membership

Section 4. Fellows

c. Privileges and Responsibilities

ADD: <u>iii. Pay no dues</u>

INSERT new section:

Section 2. American Indian Voting Members

a. Qualifications

- <u>i. Have a knowledge of their tribal traditions, history</u> <u>and/or spirituality; and</u>
- <u>ii. Have an interest in Colorado archaeology/American Indian</u> <u>history.</u>

b. Entry Procedures

- <u>i. Nominated/sponsored by one member of any tribally-</u> recognized traditional/cultural organization, or by one member of any governing tribal organization or the Colorado Commission of Indian Affairs;
- ii. Acceptance by majority vote of the Membership Committee:

<u>iii. Exceptional cases may be referred to the Executive</u> <u>Committee by the Membership Committee.</u>

c. Rights/Responsibilities

i. The same as those of Voting Members;

ii. May attend any Council meeting at their discretion.

Article VIII. Officers

REVISE as follows:

- Section 3. The <u>President</u> shall appoint a Newsletter editor who shall solicit and edit material for the newsletter of the Council and, when authorized, develop other official publications. The Newsletter Editor shall be a non-voting member of the Executive Committee. [This change standardizes the appointment procedure, re: Article X -Publications]
- Section 4. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of all officers, Newsletter Editor, <u>one American Indian Voting</u> <u>Member of the Council</u>, plus four Voting Members of the Council to be elected to the Executive Committee by the membership....

Article IX. Election of Officers

ADD:

Section 3. At the 1979 Annual Meeting, two Executive Committee positions shall be filled for two-year terms, while two positions shall be filled for one-year terms. Thereafter, two members will be elected each year for two-year terms. <u>The American Indian Voting Member of the Executive</u> <u>Committee shall serve for a two-year term. The at-large</u> <u>Committee members, and the American Indian Committee</u> <u>member, may not hold office for more than two consecutive</u> <u>terms, and after serving two consecutive terms, must not</u> <u>stand for election for the same office again for one</u> <u>term.</u> Proposed Code-of-Ethics Amendments [new language underlined]

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT AMONG COLORADO ARCHAEOLOGICAL SOCIETY COLORADO COUNCIL FOR PROFESSIONAL ARCHAEOLOGISTS COLORADO HISTORICAL SOCIETY BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT-COLORADO BUREAU OF RECLAMATION-DENVER FOREST SERVICE-ROCKY MOUNTAIN REGION AND NATIONAL PARK SERVICE-ROCKY MOUNTAIN REGION

The State of Colorado contains a wealth of prehistoric and historic (cultural) resources left by numerous past inhabitants. These resources range in age from greater than 12,000 years old to recent times.

The scientific value and information potential of these resources has only been partially recovered through scientific investigations. However, since settlement of Colorado in the 19th century, these resources have been subjected to looting, vandalism, unscientific recovery processes, and other damage (environmental and human) to varying degrees over much of the area formerly inhabited by ancient cultures.

Colorado's culturally rich land is administered by Federal, State, local, and private entities. Various laws governing the management and protection of cultural resources on Federal lands pertains to all Federal agencies and are paralleled by State laws. Components of these laws provide penalties for looting and vandalism of cultural resources and ways, in addition to law enforcement, of preventing the problem, through public education and outreach.

An informal organization, the <u>Colorado Interagency Archaeological Education and Anti-</u><u>vandalism Task Force</u> has functioned for four years. The goal of the Task Force is to combat destruction of cultural resources through coordinated efforts and pooled resources.

In furtherance of this goal, the signatories agree to continue to cooperate in public education, outreach, and crime prevention projects such as:

- o sponsorship of an annual Colorado archaeology preservation week,
- o work towards establishment of a regional and/or National archaeology week,
- o teacher workshops and training sessions,
- o public education and awareness programs, and
- o participation in inter-organizational public education work groups.

Participating agencies enter into this agreement on the date of signature, and any signatory may withdraw from the Task Force with thirty (30) days notice to the other parties.

Others: Bob Brunswig (Education Committee Chair), Susan Collins (Colorado State Archaeologist), and Rosemary Sucec.

President Kevin Black called the meeting to order at 10:10 am.

The minutes of the last executive committee meeting (July 1994) were approved.

TREASURERS REPORT - Jeannie Mobley-Tanaka

Kevin reported that the books had been audited for the period from 4/1/93 to 3/31/94. Everything was in order.

Jeannie reported that the balance in the general fund is \$5,187.84 and that the balance in the Ward Weakly fund is \$2,228.61.

It was motioned and approved that Jeannie could make the decision as to where we would move our accounts. The service charge at our existing bank is unacceptable.

NEWSLETTER - Kevin Black

Kae McDonald, an employee of Metcalf Archaeological Consultants in Eagle, has agreed to take on the duties of newsletter editor. The next newsletter will be out in early February and will announce the annual meeting.

EDUCATION - Bob Brunswig

The next CCPA Education workshop will focus on theory and practice in Colorado archaeology, with an emphasis on how to improve the RP-3 planning process. A secondary focus will cover new technologies. The workshop will be held at Ft. Lewis College, Durango.

Jeff Eighmy brought up the idea of possibly of having the Education Workshop just prior to the annual meeting in order to minimize the number of meetings. The board agreed. Bob will look into this for 1996. That would mean that the annual meeting in 1996 would be held at Ft. Lewis College.

AMERICAN INDIAN PARTICIPATION & CONSULTATION

Kevin, with the input of a number Native Americans, drafted some possible changes to the bylaws which would allow for American Indian participation and membership in our organization. He gave a brief history of how CCPA got to this point and reviewed the types of existing memberships and the existing Code of Ethics. Mike Metcalf commented that having Native American members would be a way to involve them directly in the day-to-day business of archaeology. To accomplish this we need to recognize another category of membership.

Ten proposed bylaws and Code of Ethics changes were discussed. The precise language for these changes will appear in the February 1995 newsletter, and thus will not be outlined in detail here. All of the proposed changes will be voted on by the membership at the annual meeting in March. The proposed changes appear in:

PROPOSED BYLAWS CHANGES

1 - Article II - Purpose

We (the Board and American Indian representatives) propose to add a new organization goal which would establish and promote open communication and cooperation between archaeologists and the living descendants of groups subject to archaeological research in Colorado.

2 - Article III - Membership

We propose to add a section to the privileges and responsibilities for Fellows. The addition would state that Fellows will pay no dues.

3 - Article III - Membership

We propose to add (insert) a new section (Section 2) titled "American Indian Voting members". This will include a description of qualifications, entry procedures, and rights/responsibilities.

4 - If number 3 above is accepted by the membership, all of the following section's numbers will have to be revised and moved down one number. We would then have eight sections instead of the present seven.

5 - Article VIII - Officers

We propose to revise Section 3 to state that the President shall appoint -a Newsletter editor instead of "the Council". This has nothing to do with American Indian participation, but would further streamline the task of finding a Newsletter Editor.

6 - Article VIII - Officers

We propose to revise Section 4 to include a position for one American Indian Voting Member on the Council.

7 - Article IX - Election of Officers

We propose to add a paragraph to Section 3 which would provide for procedures for American Indian members to be elected as officers.

PROPOSED CODE OF ETHICS CHANGES

8 - We propose to change the language in Section I (1) (c) to make the CCPA members responsibility to the public a stronger statement.

9 - We propose to add a new section (f) to Part III (2) which would address American Indian religious/sacred sites.

10 - We propose to change the word "archaeologist" to "CCPA member" in all places so that American Indians could sign the Code of Ethics.

ANNUAL DUES INCREASE

It was motioned and seconded to increase the dues to \$20 (from \$15) effective immediately. Associate members dues will go up to \$15. It was determined that our expenses will be going up and that we have no reserve funds.

CERAMICS PUBLICATION - Bob Brunswig

The CCPA Occasional Papers Monograph Volume 2 is now complete. Raven Press of Denver will complete the printing. They also did the last CCPA publication. There will be 185 pages of text. Bob would like someone to take over the responsibility for finding bookstores which will sell the volume and also to handle getting the publication to other conferences for sale at the Book Sales. The price of the volume will be \$10 for members, \$12 for wholesale copies and \$20 for retail copies. Authors will receive a free copy. A total of 1000 copies will be ordered.

1995 ANNUAL MEETING - Jeff Eighmy

The annual meeting will be held in Fort Collins on March 24 and 25. The meeting, as well as the Early Bird party the night of March 23, will be held at the University Park Holiday Inn adjacent to the campus of Colorado State University. Chris Zier (Centennial Archaeology) will be handling the program. The symposium will focus on paleoenvironmental reconstruction, and there will be volunteered papers as well. Chris has started tracking down items for a silent auction.

Jeannie brought up the issue of CCPA possibly providing child care at the meeting. Jeff will reserve a room at the Holiday Inn for child care, but CCPA will not underwrite because of liability issues. Jeannie will put an announcement in the newsletter stating that if anyone is interested in the child care option, they should contact her or Meg Van Ness.

STATE REGISTER ACT & THE STATE LAND BOARD - Susan Collins

Rand Greubel wrote a letter to Kevin Black questioning the requirement for archaeological survey on a high-profile state land sale near Toponas in Routt County. Since this matter is intertwined with the whole issue of interpretation of the State Register Act, Susan Collins elected to present a report to the board.

Since the State Register Act is viewed as weaker and/or more ambiguous than many federal statutes, most State agencies do not comply with the State mandate. After the Rules and Procedures for the State Register Act became effective (June 1, 1991), the State Mined Land Reclamation Board decided to have the Historical Society review all borrow pit applications and recommend whether or not an archaeological inventory should be conducted. The Historical Society recommends survey for about 40% of the pit applications it receives. These applications are from sand and gravel contractors who are obtaining a permit to mine for borrow materials on private land. The position of the Historical Society is that the issuing of a permit is a state "action." Sand and gravel contractors are now resisting this requirement, contending that--because the wording of the State Register Act is so vague--the State does not have the right or the power to recommend survey. The contractor's believe that they have only to consult with the Society regarding sites already listed in or nominated to the State Register.

Because of a recent Moffat County materials pit where the Historical Society recommended survey, this has now become a significant high-profile concern. Moffat County is requesting the Mined Land Reclamation Board to issue a declatory ruling which will define procedure on all such projects. The Historical Society has asked for an opinion from the State Attorney General which will outline exactly how the State Register Act should be interpreted. The CCPA Board decided to write a letter to the Attorney General and to the Chair of the Mined Land Reclamation Board (MLRB) expressing our concern with these recent questions raised about the intent and requirements of the Act. The letter will recommend that both the Attorney General and MLRB find in favor of procedures consistent with the requirements of the National Historic Preservation Act and the current recommendations of the State Historical Society. Carol Gleichman will draft a letter for Jeff Eighmy's signature.

ANTI-VANDALISM TASK FORCE Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) - Kevin Black

This task force is an interagency group that addresses public education as a tool to fight vandalism. Kevin signed this MOA for CCPA. CANDIDATE BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES

PRESIDENT-ELECT:

Gary Matlock is a native of Colorado and graduated from the University of Colorado. In his archaeological career of 34 years Gary has worked for a number of government agencies including the National Park Service, the Bureau of Land Management, and the Forest Service. Some highlights of his career include serving as the BLM State Archaeologist for Alaska and Colorado; supervising the BLM during the Dolores Archaeological Project, including the design and Master Plan for the Heritage Center and management of the DAP collections; and is an occasional visiting Assistant Professor of Anthropology at Ft. Lewis College in Durango. In addition, Gary has conducted field work and research in New Mexico, Arizona, and Colorado on both Anasazi culture and Hispanic sites. He has also pursued architectural studies and Historical Archaeology research at European sites in Colorado. Gary has authored more than 50 publications on archaeology, including CRM documents, monographs, and books. Most recently Gary has coedited *The State of Colorado Archaeology* with Phillip Duke, and *The Chimney Rock Symposium* with Kim Malville. He has also written a popular book, *Enemy Ancestors, The World of the Anasazi*. He is currently working on a book with Phillip Duke on the archaeology of the Durango area.

Susan M. Chandler has 20 years of archaeological experience, and has worked on projects in Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming, and El Salvador.
